Over and under housing

Purpose of the policy

- To make sure that members are provided with a suitable unit of appropriate size.
- To balance member households wants and needs with the co-op's objective to provide affordable and adequate housing to current and future members and
- To maintain the economic viability of the co-operative.

Definitions

Over-housing means having too many bedrooms for the size of the household **Under-housing** means having too few bedrooms for the size of the household

Policy

- 1. The co-op will use the following standards in determining the appropriate unit size for each household:
 - there should be no more than two residents per bedroom
 - there should be no fewer than one resident per bedroom
 - there should be enough bedrooms so that parents do not have to share a bedroom with a child
 - there should be one bedroom for each child of the opposite sex aged five or over
 - there should be one bedroom for each dependent age 18 or over.

Note: The standards in Point #1 are National Occupancy Standards

- 2. Members will be provided with sufficient bedrooms to house:
 - Children on a part-time basis at least thirty (30) percent of the month due to custody arrangements
- 3. Members must provide documentation acceptable to the co-op as outlined in the procedures.
- 4. Members must advise the co-op of any change in household size.
- 5. The board may approve a request by an over-housed or under-housed member for an exemption to the requirement to move:
 - For eighteen (18) months following a bereavement

- 6. In other cases, the co-op will require a household that is over or under-housed to move to an appropriate sized and suitable unit when one comes available. The household will be permitted to stay in the current unit until that time.
- 7. Members required to move must accept the first (1st) appropriate size and suitable unit. This procedure will be based on (most over-housed) a reverse seniority move-in date order
- 8. Current over-housed members, refusing to move to an appropriately sized and suitable unit when offered, will only receive the subsidy to which they would be entitled if they were not over-housed.
- 9. New members moving into the Co-op who will be over-housed, will only receive the subsidy to which they would be entitled if they were not over-housed.
